PRECIOUS MOMENTS IN ISRAEL

“People of Israel, your camp is lovely. It’s like a grove of palm trees or a garden beside a river.” Numbers 24:5


Having just returned from another study tour of Israel, I’ve come away with many beautiful images of this country sometimes referred to as the “Land Between.” Even though it’s a place that pulsates with threats of violence, destruction and division, it is still a land that vibrates with hope and the stirrings of peace. In the midst of trying to assemble a number of thoughts and reflections about this latest pilgrimage, I’d like to share some precious moments, which I had jotted down in my journal:

- While visiting the ancient city ruins of Bet She’an, our instructor/guide from Jerusalem University College, Aubrey Taylor, surprised us by singing a selection from Leonard Bernstein’s “Mass” on the stage of the Roman open air theatre.
- In the Church of the Holy Sepulchre, we discovered “Christian graffiti;” hundreds of crosses carved into the limestone walls.
- As we were leaving the site of Tel Hazor, a huge number of birds came spiraling up from the Hulah Basin. Absolutely breath-taking!
- On our last morning by the Sea of Galilee, we crossed to the other side by boat. We stopped in the middle for a quiet time of prayer and reflection. The sea was calm and the moment was peaceful.
- After supper one evening, I took a short stroll through a local outdoor mall close to our hotel in Jerusalem. There was an Orthodox Jew busking, playing his guitar and singing the Led Zepplin classic, “Stairway to Heaven.” Although it was a somewhat odd sight, his rendition was quite good.
- Our group was hooked up, for the two weeks, with another group from a Baptist congregation in Vancouver, Washington. Their pastor, Bob Carlson, and an elder, Dave Brown, immersed several people in the muddy waters of the Jordan River as they re-dedicated their lives to following Jesus. It was a very moving and powerful time.
- During our last evening by the Sea of Galilee, both groups gathered near the shore and celebrated the Lord’s Supper. We truly felt the deep presence of Jesus as he shared himself through this meal and brought us closer together.
- One morning when we had settled into our seats on the bus for another journey to various sites, Sophia Della Rosa led us in prayer: *“Father, thank you so much for this lovely day. Let it be filled with more amazing memories as we learn more about you and your Word. Help us to walk humbly with you as we explore and admire more of the land you created. Amen.”*

Not much more I can add to that except to say:

To God be the glory! Amen!






We're praying this awesome VBS program will touch children's hearts and lives with Jesus' love and power. Help kids in our community discover that







Acadia Lunch Program

In conjunction with McDougall United Church we are supporting a brown bag style lunch program for children at Acadia School and David Thompson. Each week 700 children need an entire lunch or a supplement because they are coming to school hungry. A child may need help once or multiple times each week.

To be able to continue this program and to keep costs minimal there is a need for either cash donations (please direct to urgent care) and/or items such as brown paper bags (lunch size or a little bigger), plastic snack bags, plastic sandwich bags and 7 oz. plastic glasses (for the fruit and veggie cups).



In addition, each week we provide 20 – 24 healthy cookies. To date there have been a few people from the congregation baking cookies, but as we move to a weekly schedule we need additional bakers. We ask the cookies be healthy and please remember NO NUTS and NO PEANUT BUTTER. This would be a huge help. That is where the Luther Reading Challenge comes in. An assortment of the reformer's writings will be presented online for everyone to read and to reflect upon. The texts range from Luther's personal letters and hymns to his doctrinal and social treatises to his catechisms and his will. Each text is prefaced with an introduction to orient the reader. The reading part is just the beginning. Readers can also participate in online discussions. You simply have to register! A little of this and a little of that.....

Do you have a used cell phones that is in good working order?

The Brenda Stafford Centre can reactive phones with new numbers and turn them over to clients who have no other source of communication.

Donated phones should be wiped clean of personal information (deletion of contact names, photos, etc.); placed in a Zip-lock bag; with a 120 VAC wall charger included (since most of the clients don't have cars- a car charger is optional). The name of the cell phone and model should be indicated on the bag. If donors wish, they may include a Telus /Bell/ Fido Pay-as-you-go card to get the user started. This would be a good way to make good use of your old phones that are no longer on contract.

Donated phones can be deposited in the collection box located in the donation cupboard at the church east entrance, on the shelf near the eye-glass collection bin.

These travel size items may be perfect for many people in need—bring these and any other items to the church for donation and we will gladly find an appropriate place for them, whether it is the Mustard Seed downtown or the pregnancy care centre.

Listening Campaign - Taking Action on Issues That Matter

A key element of the organizing process is listening carefully to our members about the issues that matter to them. We then base our action on this listening. We invite you to join us in our listening campaign. During this campaign we will identify issues we can address together while building the relationships and leaders who will enable us to take on these issues. The next listening campaign event is:

Listening To Your Organization: "House Meetings"

Date: Monday, May 2, 7:00 to 8:30 pm

Purpose: This second gathering of MACG's listening process will focus on teaching the skills for conducting "House Meetings" (small group listening sessions). House meetings can be powerful tools that enable organizations to hear the issues its members are facing, identify new leaders and build momentum to act. During this event we will also begin to hear some of the responses from the listening that has been done to date.

Strengthening Organizations and Communities

Another key element of community organizing is the strengthening of our member organizations and communities. Towards this end we offer leadership development opportunities to teach leaders how they can use community organizing strategies in their community. The first of these specialized training sessions will be held April 30.

Community Organizing for Congregational Renewal

Learn how starting with conversations that matter can lead to ministry that works and meetings that will leave people energized. This one-day workshop looks at how the basic tools of community organizing can energize and facilitate the renewal efforts happening in many congregations. We'll talk about building relationships with neighbors, raising up new leadership, and even how to have meetings that leave your people energized!

May is Mental Health Month

Mental Health Month was created over 50 years ago to raise awareness about mental health conditions and the importance of mental wellness for all.

We all have mental health, just as we all have physical health. Mental health is more than the absence of mental illness. It's a state of well-being.



During the month of May we encourage you to:

- Reflect on your own attitudes towards people living with mental health issues. Reducing discrimination and stigma is paramount, so that people with mental health issues no longer feel shame due to mental illness and will no longer think twice about getting the support and help they need.
- Be that friend who opens up the conversation. You can start by simply asking "How are you, really?" Offer to listen without judgment. And offer to do what you can to help.

Breakfast at the Seed One Saturday a month at 6 am

If you are sixteen years of age and older, and have some time on a Saturday morning, why not come out to help prep and serve breakfast for approximately 325 – 375 residents of the Mustard Seed at the Foothills Industrial Park Shelter? 6 to 8 volunteers are needed.

Simply get a loaf of bread and make sandwiches to be placed back in the bread bag. They can be any kind, ham, cheese, lettuce, mustard—whatever you would like. Bring the bag of sandwiches to the church on the second Sunday of the month and place them in one of the fridges in the Kitchen. They are then taken down to the Calgary Drop-in Centre by a member of our congregation. The Calgary Drop-in Centre is grateful to receive the sandwiches. We can make a difference!

This fund was established in 2011 in recognition of the “significant contribution of the women of the Evangelical Lutheran Women (ELW) of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada (ELCIC)”.

The initial contributions to the fund came from the residual amount remaining after the dissolution of the ELW. Individuals or groups may continue to make additional donations to the fund.

Grants for the ELCIC Women of Faith Fund will be available on an annual basis. **The annual deadline for applications is MAY 1.** Applicants must submit their proposals for review and consideration by an advisory committee appointed by National Church Council. If you have a project in mind please contact the church office for assistance and approval of the grant request.



Singing Our Lives – Part 1

Our four children, then quite young, learned to sing a set of ritual songs. First, they would gather in a circle and teach one another, clapping and singing. Then one of them might suggest using a skipping rope and they would, one after another, slip inside the whirling rope for a few dancing steps before darting away. Then one would suggest a band and instruments would be created: plastic pails serving as a drum set, a broom becoming an electric guitar, a large cardboard box transforming into an amazing keyboard.

That dancing, singing, shared music making image has come back to me many times as I have thought of matters of worship. That circle of song and movement, with its delight and physical energy, its formal, ritual character marked by surprising improvisation, remains for me an image of vitality and delight. This is but one reminder of the truth that human beings have always sung at play and at work, on festive and solemn occasions, in joy and in grief.

The act of singing together is deeply and indelibly human. When we sing, words are given greater range and power than when we speak. Something is shared in singing that goes beyond the words alone. This something has taken shape over many centuries in a practice that expresses our deepest yearning and priceless joy: the practice of singing our lives.

There is something about us that needs to make music, something that insists on song. It is not surprising then that music and song are so closely linked with the praise of divinity. As Saint Augustine observed long ago, whoever sings “prayers twice,” in music as well as text. From its very origin, the Christian community sang. In the New Testament, Paul’s letters are punctuated by doxologies, hymn fragments, and references to the practice of singing in worshipping assemblies. In writing to the church at Colossae, he joins singing to teaching and admonition, wisdom and the Word (Colossians 3:16).

The Christian church was born singing the songs of ancient Israel, the synagogue, and the Greco-Roman world. Psalms and canticles formed the heart of prayer and the music of the earliest Christian assemblies. Luke's Gospel barely gets through the second chapter without bursting into song four times: Mary sings that her soul magnifies the Lord, Zechariah sings blessing to the Lord of Israel, the angels sing "Glory to God in the highest," and Simeon sings a farewell song of peace. Each of these songs became regular parts of Christian daily prayers within the first two centuries. Saint Augustine, writing in the fourth century, could observe: "Apart from those moments when the scriptures are being read or a sermon is preached, when the bishop is praying aloud or the deacon is speaking the intention of the litany of community prayers, is there any time when the faithful assembled are not singing?"

We continue to sing these songs from Luke's Gospel, as well as many other songs both ancient and new. We continue to sing not alone, but in union with the whole creation and with our sisters and brothers through the ages. The gathering of a community of faith to sing praises to God seems such a simple act, and it has been going on for over two millennia. But we should not take this practice for granted. It needs to be learned and nurtured and taught.

Read and Reflect: Colossians 3:16

Discuss and Reflect:

What in this reading leads you to say, "I wonder about..." or, "I noticed..."

Consider sharing (and singing) a song from childhood that is part of your faith tradition. What is the most powerful memory the song evokes? What does it say about the faith of your childhood? Are there connections to the faith of your adulthood?

Reflect on the various ways in which music is sung in worship.

Comment on the following: *"The gathering of a community of faith to sing praises to God seems such a simple act, and it has been going on for over two millennia. But we should not take this practice for granted. It needs to be learned and nurtured and taught."*

Pray together: *Maker of creation's choir, you sing the Song of Love to us. Breathe your Spirit into our singing until the rhythm of your mercy shapes all our music-making and we join with one another to give you thanks and praise.*

Get on PAR (Pre-Authorized Remittance) at LCOS

PAR: If you give by the Pre-Authorized Remittance (PAR) Program and you have made a change to your pledge amount for 2016 (as compared to 2015), you will need to complete a PAR Amount Change form and submit to the Financial Secretary via church mailbox # 91. If the form is submitted by February 01, 2016 the amount will be effective for the February 20, 2016 withdrawal.







Experience teaches:

- jaws are not meant to be broken... Aaron broke his skiing at the end of last year, and then gave our blender a serious workout over the next six weeks! Thanks to God's goodness and an amazing team of doctors, it seems to be as good as new. Just a bit more 'experienced'! ;-)



Generator conundrum:

We have a generator in the Solomons to help out when town ('mains') power gets cut. We need to run our generator at 1500 rpm to get 220 V / 50 Hz output power (we're just like Australia). However, if it's running at 1500 rpm under load, then when mains power comes back on and the auto-switch takes the load off the generator it usually results in an 'over-speed' shutdown. We're safe to run at ~1380 rpm / 46 Hz (in terms of no over-speed shutdown), but our uninterruptible power supplies (UPS) aren't happy with such 'dirty' power so they run on battery (that is, as if there was no generator) until they die. And if mains power isn't back on by the time the UPS battery dies, whatever it was powering also dies... So if any of you diesel mechanics out there

Last time we wrote, Paul had just gotten back from a **four week trip to the Solomons**. Well, it's a different year and a different month, but much the same story! Paul was gone to the Solomons for four weeks during the months of February and March. His main aim was to continue checking the Doku translation of the book of Genesis, but there were other things to keep him busy while there. There always are!

His time there began with our translation group's **biennial conference**. Every two years the members of the Solomon Islands Translation Advisory Group (SITAG) get together to hear how things have been going with our colleagues, get a sense of where we're going together, take care of business, and pray and encourage one another. We also had a pastor from the States with us who took us through various 'encounters with Jesus' found in the Gospels. It was good to be reminded that Jesus wants to meet with us, and also that we have decisions to make that affect how those meetings go.

After our conference, Paul was able to **work with Fr. John Peter Varea on his translation of Genesis**. We're pleased to say we made it past the half-way mark—we finished checking to the end of chapter 27! If it was Matthew's gospel, we'd almost be done (in fact, we would have worked extra just to finish!). But since this is Genesis we have another 22 chapters to go. It's a big book... And part of its 'bigness' is that it is so foundational to every book that follows.

Last time we mentioned a few **'figures of speech'** that made their way into the translation of Genesis. Here are a few more we're going to test:

- *igha thaghe* 'foreigner; lit. outside fish, a fish not normally found on the reef' ("This fellow came here as a foreigner, and now he wants to play the judge!" [Gn. 19:9])
- *ponoti kuli* 'compensation; lit. close ears, make it so that the story is not spread' (And he said to Sarah, "Look, I am giving your 'brother' 1,000 pieces of silver in the presence of all these witnesses. This is to compensate you for any wrong I may have done to you. This will settle any claim against me, and your reputation is cleared." [Gn. 20:16])
- *vangalaka* 'love; show kindness; be generous, friendly; bless; lit. more food / eat more [*vanga* is both a noun ('food') and a verb ('eat')]' It has been a challenge to find a generic term for 'bless'. The best we have found so far is this word, which, in a culture where feasting and generosity are high values, makes some sense. The question is whether this has a broad enough range of meaning to account for things like, "In your seed all the nations of the earth will be blessed" (Gn. 22:18).

Along with the translation work, there were other things to do, such as configuring routers on our network, solving computer issues for colleagues, working on our generator. [On that note, if anyone out there knows diesel engine generators—especially governors—we'd love to hear from you! (see details in side bar)]

On Paul's next to last day in the Solomons he was able to meet with most of the Doku translators. It was good for them to hear where each other are at, what they're working on, and how they plan to **engage the**


Housing conundrum:

wider language community in reviewing the drafts that we have checked to the 'second draft' stage. This is an important step in finding out how well (or not...) the translation is communicating to the people who will use it. The translator usually knows what he or she *meant* to say, but sometimes the hearer / reader doesn't. Our hope is that Doku people will have the courage to speak up if something isn't clear, so that we can work to improve it. The reality often is, however, that people are so excited to hear something even *remotely close* to 'good'—anything in their language at all, in fact—that they don't think it could possibly be any better! It's even trickier if it's the first time they have heard the translation—we've seen the satisfied smiles and heard the thrilled laughter, and it is heart-warming; but even better at this stage would be someone who would say, "That's nice, but..." We need critics; gentle would be nice, brave would be good, thorough would be best.

Life at home continues at a fever pace! Hannah is just a few months from high school graduation! She thankfully survived the daunting university application process and was accepted to Trinity Western with a President's Scholarship! We're proud of her for that. Isaac spends his free time writing computer 'code' on his Raspberry Pi (an inexpensive credit-card sized computer to introduce kids to computer programming) Nathan and Aaron are just finishing up their basketball seasons; their teams didn't win too many games, but they worked hard and had a lot of fun! And Rachael stays busy playing with her friends and creating mountains of art work!! Cathy has been busy driving to all the above mentioned basketball games, but has been able to type up a number of handwritten first drafts we have received recently. She's currently working through 1 & 2 Corinthians.

Well, **spring is in the air** here in Salmon Arm. The hockey and ski seasons are winding down and it's time to get the bikes ready for summer! That includes Paul's motorcycle. He's getting closer to getting it back together after a winter 'custoration' (customization and restoration). Rachael asked for a ride last week, so the heat is on!

We trust you enjoyed the celebration of Easter that just passed. We had a wonderful sermon Easter Sunday on Christ's resurrection which is the foundation and hope of all that we believe—a belief that shows life is eternal and death the temporary intruder.
