BREAK FORTH IN PRAYER

In 1977, Arlen Salte began an amazing journey, creating an evangelical Christian ministry of music and worship. First known as New Creation Ministries, it evolved into Break Forth Ministries with founders and directors, Arlen and Elsa Salte, who have been married for over thirty years. The Saltes have been guided by the goal of “sharing the life-giving message of the Gospel in the language of the people.” For the past twenty years this ministry has become internationally known for offering the largest equipping and renewal event in North America, the Break Forth Canada Conference. It has been a gathering place for Christ-followers of all generations and across all denominations to be renewed, equipped and unleashed. Registrants come from 1,000 churches around the world, filling the Shaw Conference Centre in Edmonton. Not too bad, since the goal of the first conference was to have 75 people register. However, 250 people registered that year, meeting at a local church in Sherwood Park. Some of the presenters and musicians, through the years, have included: Philip Yancey, MercyMe, Casting Crowns, the Skit Guys, Tony Campolo, Phil Callaway and Nick Vujicic.

For a number of years, Arlen and Elsa have hooked up with Hans Weichbrodt, to lead trips to Israel. Which now leads to that “*something huge*” God has “*in store for Break Forth Ministries' 40th anniversary this year.*” Arlen, Elsa and Hans have been invited to be the founders of an historic gathering in Jerusalem this coming June 5-8: the first nationally sponsored Christian Gathering and Prayer Breakfast! This has been endorsed by the Israeli President, Reuven Rivlin and hundreds of world leaders are expected to attend. Various venues will be used for times of prayer over those four days, including the President's residence.

God continues to do incredible, miraculous things through his servants as we “break forth in prayer!”



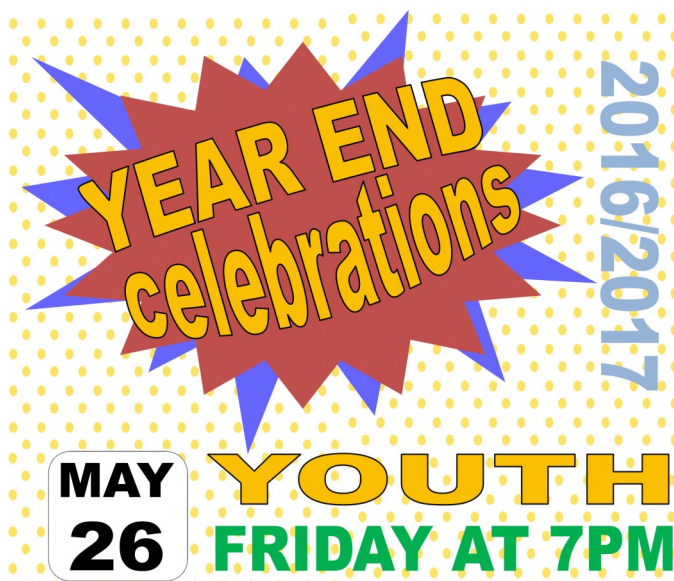

The Lay Academy



The establishment of the **LAY ACADEMY** evolved in response to the leadership needs of congregations and the interest expressed by lay people for a comprehensive program of study. It is to provide lay persons (both potential and appointed), with progressively developed skills in theology, leadership and discipleship.

It arose from the vision of the four western synods of the ELCIC as expressed through the action of the Lutheran Theological Seminary's (LTS) Board of Governors in the Strategic Plan of 2016 and consists of two streams – general education and specially authorized education.

The purpose of the **LAY ACADEMY** is to provide educational programs that deepen the spiritual life, as well as the theological and biblical understanding of the laity in the ELCIC. The **LAY ACADEMY** has also been instructed with developing the educational component of the ELCIC's National Authorized Lay Ministry program.



In the general education stream of the **LAY ACADEMY** three courses will be offered in a calendar year. Classes are to meet the needs and priorities of the church, be accessible to the broader church, meet the needs of the Authorized Lay Ministry program, provide for biblical and theological grounding, as well as skill sets necessary for work and mission in the congregation, and living faithfully in daily life.

Some of the **LAY ACADEMY** sessions and course will be provided through an online format that allows multiple sites from across the four Western provinces and Territories to listen and interact with the presenter at the same time, while also enjoying discussion led by a facilitator within a local church setting. Some courses and sessions will use face-to-face settings and others a combination of online and in-person. It all makes for a collaborative teaching and learning experience!

If you're interested in growing your faith, learning more about the Bible, and expanding your knowledge in leadership and service, consider participating in a **LAY ACADEMY** session or course.

Rev. Dr. Kayko Driedger Hesslein, AB June 3 "Theology of Welcoming"

Kayko Driedger Hesslein was born and raised in Calgary, receiving her M. Div from the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Philadelphia. She was ordained in the Eastern Synod of the ELCIC and served her first parish in Toronto from 2002-2007. She then received her PhD in Systematic Theology (with a minor in Christian and Jewish History) from Graduate Theological Union in Berkeley, California. Kayko and her family moved back to Calgary in 2014 to become the interim pastor at St. John's Lutheran. She has taught courses at Pacific Lutheran Theological Seminary and the Lutheran Theological Seminary in Saskatoon.



Dr. Fike Tsehai, BC June 3 "Making a Difference Through Resettlement"

Fikre M Tsehai is the Development Manager of the Refugee Resettlement Program for Canadian Lutheran World Relief, working out of Western Regional office in New Westminster, BC. He studied at the University of Paris in France obtaining his Doctorate in 1984. For the past 25 years, he has been working with Lutheran Churches and other community groups to resettle refugees in Canada and has been instrumental in resettling over 10,000 refugees in all parts of the country. Fikre has been a member of the Sponsorship Agreement Holders Association Council serving three consecutive terms. He has also served as a member of the Executive Council for the Canadian Council for Refugees (CCR).



Rev. Jason Johnson, SK June 10 "Congregational Challenges in Reconciliation"

Jason Johnson is a graduate from the Lutheran Theological Seminary and presently serves as the pastor of St. John's Lutheran Church in Laird while also working as a counsellor at an inner-city elementary school in Saskatoon. He has played a key role in building community amidst the Lutherans, Mennonites, and the Young Chipewyan Band in the process of reconciliation for Treaty 6. <https://www.reserve107thefilm.com/>. He also participates in advocacy work with Saskatoon Native Ministry in areas of poverty, homelessness, gang lifestyle, and missing and murdered Indigenous women.



Rev. Tyler Gingrich, MB June 10 "Finding Our Way in Upholding God's Mission"

Tyler Gingrich has a B.A. in English Literature and Political Science from the University of Victoria and studied at the Lutheran Theological Seminary in Saskatoon from 2002 to 2004. He has served as a pastor in Spiritwood, Saskatchewan and Kelowna, BC. In 2012 he became the Youth Engagement Coordinator for Canadian Lutheran World Relief and in 2015 Assistant to the Bishop for Youth and Young Adult Ministry for Manitoba and the Northwestern Ontario Synod. Tyler participated in the Justice and Reconciliation Tour to Split Lake, Manitoba in 2016 and is currently one of the co-leaders of monthly youth services at Epiphany Indigenous Anglican Church in Winnipeg.

Message from the Bishop



May 2017 Message for Congregations and Lay and Rostered Leaders

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ –

I invite your prayers for the 12th Assembly of the Lutheran World Federation taking place May 10-16, 2017 in Windhoek, Namibia. The ELCIC will be represented by four delegates: National Bishop Susan Johnson, Rev. Katherine Altenburg, Dan LeBlanc and myself. In addition, I have been nominated by the North American region to serve as a council member of the LWF. Including travel time to Namibia I will be away May 7-19.

The Lutheran World Federation (LWF) is a global communion of 145 churches in the Lutheran tradition, representing over 74 million Christians in 98 countries. Once every six years, delegates from the member churches gather to convene an Assembly, and set the vision and priorities of the communion. As well as determining the direction of the LWF, we examine issues facing our churches, and worship together in a celebration of communion and cultural diversity. As the LWF's supreme authority, the Assembly is responsible for safeguarding the Constitution, electing its next set of leaders, acting on reports, speaking out on issues concerning the life and witness of member churches, and setting the overall direction for the ensuing period.

The theme of this Assembly is, *Liberated by God's Grace*, with sub-themes focusing on issues pertinent to our time: that salvation is not a gift that can be bought, and that exploitation of people and environmental degradation are critical issues of our time that demand our attention.

Each LWF Assembly is unique. It is shaped by the historical juncture in which it takes place, its venue, and the people who help shape its character, define its purposes and determine its outcomes. The Assembly is excited to meet in Namibia, a country that is deeply rooted in the Lutheran tradition.

The year 2017 marks the 500th anniversary of the Reformation. This Assembly is the venue for its global commemoration.

The choice of Namibia as the venue for the Twelfth Assembly has great significance for the LWF. The story of the relationship between the LWF and the Lutheran churches in Namibia is closely intertwined with the national struggle and victory against apartheid so that justice, freedom and dignity could be achieved for all Namibians. To anchor the Assembly in Namibia is

to epitomize and celebrate this accompaniment made possible by the grace of God. It is also significant that the global commemoration of the Reformation is taking place in Namibia during the Assembly. With Lutherans comprising half the population, Namibia exemplifies the way in which the Lutheran faith has been embraced and has effectively taken root in other lands outside of Europe.

Hopes for the Twelfth Assembly are summed up in four key words: joyful, transformative, forward-looking, outward-looking.

- Joyful - we celebrate diversity and the sense of belonging to one global communion;
- Transformative - we will develop clear insights and a powerful narrative of what it means to work together towards a just, peaceful and reconciled world;
- Forward-looking - we will embrace the future with courage and hope and in this process upholding the generation that embodies this future;
- Outward-looking - we will strengthen ecumenical involvement and engagement in the world through compassionate diaconal concern and unwavering passion for the Gospel of Jesus Christ

In total, around 800 participants – including nearly 400 delegates – will gather in Namibia. The Assembly will be hosted by the three Lutheran member churches: Evangelical Lutheran Church in Namibia, Evangelical Lutheran Church in the Republic of Namibia and Evangelical Lutheran Church in Namibia-German Evangelical Lutheran Church. These churches are joined and work together through a common platform, the United Church Council of the Namibian Evangelical Lutheran Churches.

Mental Health & The Church

Mental Health Week in Canada is May 1-7, 2017. This is a national event to encourage people from all walks of life to learn, talk, reflect and engage others on all issues relating to mental health. One fifth of Canadians in any year experienced a mental health problem or illness. In addition, 1.6 million Canadians report their mental health care needs are not being met. The efforts we make to deal with mental health issues are an investment in the mental wealth of our population.

There still is a great deal of stigma about mental health issues. Communities of faith can be a means of breaking the silence about these issues because these communities can be a source of hospitality, healing and hope. Dear Archbishop Hiltz, (Anglican)

I am a member of .. I have lived with a mental illness, bipolar disorder, for over 40 years.

It has affected every aspect of my life. Many times I almost killed myself, because I could no longer endure the pain and despair. At such times, it was my belief in God's abiding love, no matter my condition, that enabled me to choose life.

In light of Christ's passion, death and resurrection, I believed I was not alone in my suffering, because Christ was at my side. I believed that my suffering was not the final word. The final word was the Father's faithful love.

I also knew of Christ's special care for the poor, the sick and the outcasts. It leaps off the pages of the gospels. Christ even went so far as to identify with the least of his brothers and sisters. I cannot adequately express how much all of this meant to me. Mental illness brings with it a profound shame and loss of dignity. In spite of this, I still believed I was God's beloved son.

Therefore, I have been deeply saddened, to the point of tears, that Christian churches have not proclaimed to the mentally ill these words of consolation. How much suffering would have been allayed. We are like the man in St. Luke's parable who was left half-dead in the ditch as the priest and Levite passed by.

The church needs to stop and take notice of us, and then climb down into the ditch, kneel by our side and whisper into our ear that we are God's delight. He will never leave us alone. If the church were to take time to listen to our stories of terror and darkness, it would never pass us by. Remember the words Yahweh spoke to Moses from the burning bush,

"I have observed the misery of my people who are in Egypt; I have heard their cry on account of their taskmasters. Indeed, I know their sufferings" (Exodus 3:7). These words initiated the Israelites' long journey into freedom. Would that we who live with mental illness could hear these words proclaimed by the church. We would know that God was with us as we traversed our personal deserts.

I am dumbfounded why the church has failed to do this. Is it because of ignorance on the church's part or the stigma attached to mental illness? It is as if we are invisible or unworthy of being cared for. The church, by not seeing us or caring for us, implicitly increases our shame and intensifies the stigma. We are not worthy of its attention. This is no longer tolerable, given our numbers, the severity of our suffering, the number of us who commit suicide and society's increasing understanding of mental illness. We are no longer in the Dark Ages when mental illness was seen as a form of possession or the result of sin.



Mental Health cont.....

In an effort to increase the awareness and understanding of the impact mental illness has upon a person, on several occasions,... The response of the community has been heartwarming. I do not have to hide. I am loved and consoled in all the seasons of my life. I am free to be me.

With the encouragement and supportour church has reached out to the mentally ill and their families in the greater community. Twice we have held a blessing ceremony for them to manifest that they are beloved children of God. At each of these ceremonies, an Anglican priest spoke of his/her experience of mental illness, thus providing the power of testimony. We plan to continue offering these blessings in the coming years, and we hope they might spread to other Anglican churches in our diocese.

What I am requestingwould only involve opening its eyes, listening to our cries and proclaiming God's good news to us... "Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted." "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to preach the gospel to the poor; he has sent me to heal the broken hearted, to preach deliverance to the captives, and recovering of sight to the blind, to set at liberty them that are bruised" (Luke 4:18). If this were done, how many hearts would be consoled? If the church were to listen to and act upon the words of Jesus, "As long as you did not do this to the least of my brothers and sisters, you did not do it to me" (Matthew 25:40), there would be no option in this matter.

I conclude with the words of Jean Vanier: "He who is or has been deeply hurt has a right to be sure he is loved" (Tears of Silence).....

Get on PAR (Pre-Authorized Remittance) at LCOS

Did you know that you may give to LCOS via pre-authorized remittance one time per month from your bank or credit union chequing account? This program is like any other pre-authorized debit program and is called the PAR (Pre-Authorized Remittance) program. Debits will be drawn from accounts on the 20th of each month. Whenever the 20th falls on a weekend or holiday, the debits will be drawn on the first business day following the 20th. Donations via the PAR program will be recorded on quarterly statements and year-end tax receipts along with all other giving.
