Christmas Carolling



Ever since I was in Junior High, Christmas carolling has held a special place in my heart. It really began when our youth group at church went carolling very early Christmas morning. The week before our pastor would contact a number of elderly people whom he described as “shut-ins.” Then leaving the church that frosty morning, there was a caravan of vehicles taking us sleepy-eyed and sleepy-headed youth to each house. Amazingly, people were waiting for us at their front doors to this motley crew of questionable singers. Yet everyone was gracious, some had cookies for us and one gentleman even shoveled his sidewalk before we arrived. However, one year at one house, we had a different experience. Even though Pastor Behnken knocked rather loudly at the front door, no one answered. He told us that was okay, he knew where her bedroom window was, we just needed to sing louder. While we gave it all we had, still no light came on and no one came to the window. As we trudged back to the cars, we heard a voice a few houses away. It seems we had gone to the wrong house.

Years later, at our first parish in North Dakota, I decided to share this same wonderful experience of Christmas carolling with our youth group. Surprisingly, they weren’t as excited as I was about Christmas morning. However, they were game to go out some afternoon and sing some carols for shut-ins and those having a tough time. One place I wanted to take them was the “home” of Hans Hanson. He was an elderly bachelor who lived in a run-down shack. His place had no running water or electricity and he managed to keep warm in the winter by burning tires inside his place! I’m not sure he remembered the last time he took a bath; he was perpetually filthy, toothless and had been known to chase people away with a shotgun. The kids knew this and thought I was not dealing with a full deck. They told me they would follow as long as I went to the door first while they stayed at least 50 feet away. I knocked on the door, Hans recognized me, and I explained that these kids, huddled in the distance, wanted to sing Christmas carols. He stood by the door and a few carols were sung. Suddenly he came charging at them with his fists raised. Not surprisingly, the kids ran back to the vehicles and hid behind them. As it turned out, Hans had fists full of coins for the kids, thankful that they had sung to him.



We just never know the impact we have when we take the time to join in the holy venture of Christmas carolling! So, sing, sing, sing, with all your heart and great joy!



Stewardship



A total of 70 pledges have been received on Stewardship Sunday, November 26, 2017 committing a total of \$172,356 for 2018.

This compares to last year where there were 77 pledges received committing a total of \$207,020.

This is a 16.75% decrease in the amount pledged.

If you were not able to submit a pledge on Stewardship Sunday, you may still submit one. On Sunday Mornings you can ask an usher for a pledge card and place in the offering plate or contact Cliff Blumhagen directly.

Get on PAR (Pre-Authorized Remittance) at LCOS

Did you know that you may give to LCOS via pre-authorized remittance one time per month from your bank or credit union chequing account? This program is like any other pre-authorized debit program and is called the PAR (Pre-Authorized Remittance) program. Debits will be drawn from accounts on the 20th of each month. Whenever the 20th falls on a weekend or holiday, the debits will be drawn on the first business day following the 20th. Donations via the PAR program will be recorded on quarterly statements and year-end tax receipts along with all other giving.

Amounts from PAR can be directed to:

- 1) The LCOS general budget
- 2) Canadian Lutheran World Relief (CLWR)
- 3) Capital Maintenance

You can give additional amounts and to other purposes via your regular donation envelopes. The minimum amount to give via this program is a total of \$50.00 per month.

You can sign up, make banking or donation amount changes, or withdraw from the program at any time. These changes will be effective the month following the submission of the change. Forms are available to process these changes. The program is administered by the Financial Secretary. Authorization forms are available in the Place of Welcome.





Bishop's Message



Dear Beloved of God –

As we enter the season of Advent I have been thinking of Joseph and Mary journeying to Bethlehem. The gospel writer tells us that as the hour of birth drew near they tried to secure lodging and they found no room in the inn (Luke 2:7).

Founded in this verse Las Posadas (literally “the inns”) developed as a tradition based on the unavailability of shelter. For nine days (usually occurring nine days before Christmas) los peregrinos (the pilgrims) walk through darkened streets carrying candles to accompany the Holy Family. They travel from house to house requesting lodging and singing carols. The procession is invited inside to enjoy food and drink before they are turned away by someone posing as los mesoneros (the innkeepers).



La comunidad is invited to partake in the pilgrimage and await the birth of the child; but for many walking in solidarity with the Holy Family means more than simply re-enacting the familiar biblical story. The re-enactment reminds participants of the challenge of providing a home for all and of the millions who have journeyed from home and land to refugee camps or to other countries. The re-enactment remembers a God who calls us to hospitality, lest we, too, leave Jesus out in the cold.

To remember involves more than abstract thought; it involves praxis. Re-enacting Las Posadas signifies the risk-taking and life-seeking migrations of millions. Participating in Las Posadas reveals the most basic understanding of who God is and what acts we are called to enact. Dr. Ana María Pineda reminds us that when we participate in this annual Advent practice, we “ritually participate in being rejected and being welcomed, in slamming the door on the needy and opening it wide. [We] are in this way renewed in the Christian practice of hospitality, the practice of providing a space where the stranger is taken in and known as one who bears gifts” (Ana María Pineda, “Hospitality,” in *Practicing Our Faith: A Way of Life for a Searching People*, ed. Dorothy C. Bass [San Francisco: Jossey-Bass, 1997], 29-42 [31]).



This Advent, though we may not ourselves participate in Las Posadas, I invite you to ponder with me and then to move to action as we consider the Christian practice of hospitality. Who is that stranger for whom we are called to provide a space? How might we share and receive, and learn from, the gift of hospitality? How might we experience the stranger as gift...les we, too, leave Jesus out in the cold?



This will be his third time here to share a Saturday seminar and preach during both worship services the next day. He “has always carried a passion for reading God’s Word as well as a passion for exploring the natural world. His zest for both combines and comes to life in his clearly written books which challenge Bible readers to mature their understanding of the physical geography, human geography (culture), and natural history (plants and animals) of the biblical world. The Holy Spirit speaks geographically, Bible readers who tune their understanding of the language will never read their Bibles the same way. Jack has led three of our study tours to Israel and his latest book is [The Holy Land for Christian Travelers: An Illustrated Guide to Israel](#). We also have a number of his books in the church library.



Jack will be here, January 13-14. On the 13th he will lead a seminar from 9 am. to 3 pm. The theme for that day will be “Along the Road: How Jesus Used Geography to Tell God’s Story.” The cost of the seminar is \$25/person for advance tickets, which includes lunch, and \$30 at the door. Jack will also be sharing two Bethany stories during the 9 am. and 11 am. worship services on Sunday. (Tickets available for purchase by December 10).

Jack and his wife, Marmy, will be our guests that weekend and we are absolutely delighted and honored that they will be with us.
