From Pastor Julianne

In my early twenties, a senior member of our congregation shared a story of her early married life. "I used to walk by the furniture store window every afternoon and dream about the couch we were going to purchase. I would imagine what it would look like in my living room, dream about the day our family could gather together on it, all snuggled in. Some days I would think of the colour we would paint the walls and which pillows I would use on it. Other days I would rearrange the room in my imagination, placing the chairs around the couch just so. It was different then," she continued. "In those days we saved money or paid on account week after week until it was fully paid. Nowadays it seems like people buy something on credit, take it home and pay for it as they can." Mrs. MacLeod paused as if she was remembering the moment. "You young people miss the experience of anticipation when you buy what you want right away."

Mrs. Macleod's story taught me about the gift of waiting. Now many years later, I too recognize the joy of anticipation, the value of being able to imagine the possibilities of the future. As we enter the season of Advent, the experience of the people of Israel, generation after generation anticipating the coming Messiah comes to mind. Their faithful trust in the promises of God was based on the words of the prophets. From the book of Isaiah:

The Lord himself will give you the sign. Look! The virgin will conceive a child! She will give birth to a son and will call him Immanuel (which means 'God is with us'). 7:10 NLT

For a child is born to us, a son is given to us. The government will rest on his shoulders. And he will be called: Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace. 9:6-7 NLT

Say to those with fearful hearts, "Be strong, and do not fear, for your God is coming to destroy your enemies. He is coming to save you." 35:4-6 NLT

Sing for joy, O heavens! Rejoice, O earth! Burst into song, O mountains! For the LORD has comforted his people and will have compassion on them in their suffering. Yet Jerusalem says, "The LORD has deserted us; the Lord has forgotten us." "Never! Can a mother forget her nursing child? Can she feel no love for the child she has borne? But even if that were possible, I would not forget you! See, I have written your name on the palms of my hands. 49:13-16 NLT

As the people of Israel waited with anticipation, God continued to shape the world, preparing for just the right time for Jesus, the Christ to come to live among them and change the world forever.

As we wait with anticipation for what God has for us next, God continues to shape the world, working in the hearts and lives of people around us, for just the right time for us to join in God's work of love for changing the world.

As we wait with anticipation for what God has for us next, let us continue to pray, "Lord God, you have called your servants to ventures of which we cannot see the ending, by paths as yet untrodden, through perils unknown. Give us faith to go out with good courage, not knowing where we go, but only that your hand is leading and your love supporting us; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. (Eric Milner-White, Daily Prayer, 1956)

LCBI Annual General Meeting

On Saturday, October 13th, I attended, on behalf of LCOS, the AGM for the Lutheran Collegiate Bible Institute. I was already on campus sharing in the festivities of their Homecoming Weekend, so it made sense to represent our congregation. Up until this year, the high school's annual meeting has been held during the ELCIC national convention. However, recently, the Lutheran constituency of the school was expanded beyond the ELCIC to include NALC (North American Lutheran Church), CALC (Canadian Association of Lutheran Churches) and LCC (Lutheran Church-Canada).

This initial meeting was held at Bethlehem Lutheran Church in Outlook. LCBI's President, Wayne Hove, shared a positive report. In 2015, the enrolment was only 57 students. This year, there are 82. Mr. Hove's vision is that in a couple of years there will be over 100 students. His comment was that "the wilderness is behind us." A larger percentage of those attending grades 9-12 are now day students. In past years, most of the students lived in the dorms on campus.

There have been staff cuts in the past due to smaller enrolments and consequently the position of Chaplain was eliminated over the last four years. It is hoped that this position will be re-instated in the near future.

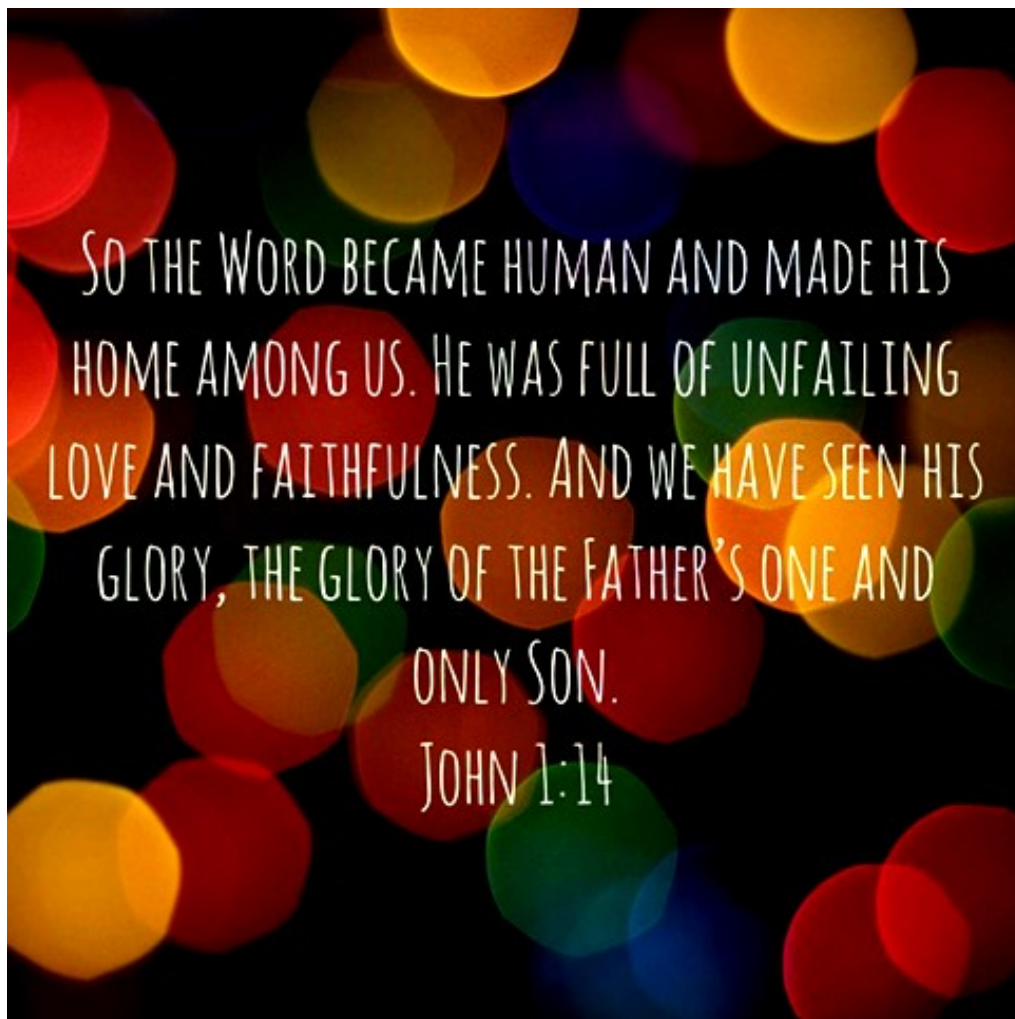

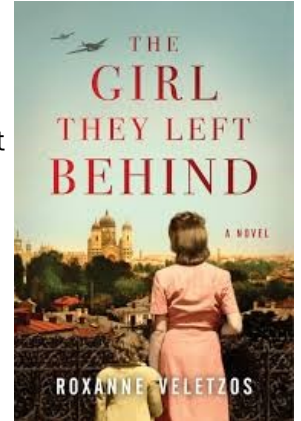
Thank you to everyone that helped with our work bee on November 17th. Between the work bee and individual families the congregation donated a total of 320 boxes so far.

Spiritual Direction



Are you interested in exploring spiritual direction?

Spiritual direction is a spiritual practice of listening and supporting someone to deepen their relationship with God and grow in their spirituality. The intention is to create a space where a person can grow in their openness to perceiving and being shaped by God's presence and activity in their life.

Spiritual direction is a simple, but profound process. A directee meets monthly with a director. The time begins with a period of immersion in prayer and scripture. Then together they listen prayerfully for how God is speaking in scripture and the circumstances of life.

Get on PAR (Pre-Authorized Remittance) at LCOS

Did you know that you may give to LCOS via pre-authorized remittance one time per month from your bank or credit union chequing account? This program is like any other pre-authorized debit program and is called the PAR (Pre-Authorized Remittance) program. Debits will be drawn from accounts on the 20th of each month. Whenever the 20th falls on a weekend or holiday, the debits will be drawn on the first business day following the 20th. Donations via the PAR program will be recorded on quarterly statements and year-end tax receipts along with all other giving.

Amounts from PAR can be directed to:

- 1) The LCOS general budget
- 2) Canadian Lutheran World Relief (CLWR)
- 3) Capital Maintenance

You can give additional amounts and to other purposes via your regular donation envelopes.

The minimum amount to give via this program is a total of \$50.00 per month.

You can sign up, make banking or donation amount changes, or withdraw from the program at any time. These changes will be effective the month following the submission of the change. Forms are available to process these changes. The program is administered by the Financial Secretary. Authorization forms are available in the Place of Welcome.

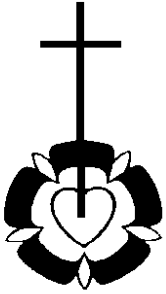

Bishop's Message



Dear Beloved of God –

We are taught by the morning newspaper headlines and by the evening news broadcasts to know names like: Donald Trump, Theresa May, Emmanuel Macron, Kim Jong-un, Vladimir Putin, Emperor Augustus, Quirinius – governor of Syria. Important people. Politicians, some of whom use power, who keep records – who announce that the world should be registered – and the entire world moves at their command – even the poor and the pregnant!

Rome reaches out its long arms to the little towns of Nazareth and Bethlehem and tightens its grip on its subjects through taxation and military might and population control – the empire-building business!

But the name Augustus meant more than just an inconvenient government decree for an imperial document carved forever in marble heralded the birth-day of Augustus as the birth-day of a god! Set in stone, this declaration announced the birth of Augustus as good news to the world! As emperor he was called *soter*, which means, “savior.” He was: “god on earth in human form, protector of the state, cause of peace and of blessing in the inhabited world!” His laws were presented in official propaganda as, “good tidings of great joy.”

The official party-line proclaimed that if you want to see deity at work look to the Emperor, savior, god, the rising star, the bringer of peace, the one who brings “good tidings of great joy!” And yet, what the record tells is of organized violence, militarism and exploitation of the poor. Of an emperor – a savior – who killed three of his sons and one of his wives, and a number of close advisors because he feared their disloyalty.

This is how the Christmas gospel begins – with a word of power – a decree – with powerful, important people in the powerhouse cities of Rome and Jerusalem. But the gospel writer doesn’t stop there instead the writer tells of a bunch of politically powerful nobodies – like Joseph and Mary from the backward town of Nazareth – in a stable, in a dot-on-the-map-town called Bethlehem, surrounded by a group of scraggy low-life shepherds who lived in the fields and who, likely as not, smelled to high heaven!

The gospel writer invites us to listen carefully and to look closely as the stone-cut declaration about Emperor Augustus is countered with another word – this one delivered by heavenly messenger rather than Roman decree.

This gospel writer, you see, is busy re-arranging and contrasting our ideas about power, about history, about good news of great joy – in this child lying in a manger – heard against the backdrop of empire builders, power brokers and census takers.

To people suffering under unbelievable oppression, under the thumb of imperial Rome – Luke proclaims that they will hear and see truly good news not in imperial decrees, but in a manger -in this “good news of great joy for all the people” – in a birth announcement which calls forth worship and adoration, amazement and awe, wide-eyed wonder and running feet – and hope.

If we are not stunned by this declaration, perhaps it is because we fail to see what God is up to for when God chooses to challenge the empire and the idolatry of imperial power God comes as a helpless infant; when God chooses to bring hope God comes not as a declaration cut into marble but as a babe wrapped in strips of cloth; and when God chooses to embrace us and all of humanity with the gift of love God comes not as a decree but in flesh.

Bishop's Message

This gospel writer invites us to ask the very real questions. The very real questions during the candle lighting and the gathering with family and friends, with strangers and friends; in the midst of our very real grief, and our very real concerns for our family and friends and for this world: who saves and who gives peace? And who claims our ultimate loyalty? And who is it that brings good news of great joy?

Come to Bethlehem and see
Him whose birth the angels sing
Come, adore on bended knee
Christ the Lord, the newborn king.

A Victory for the Calgary Alliance for the Common Good and Calgary Seniors!

To the members and friends of the Calgary Alliance for the Common Good:

Two years ago our Alliance listened to its members. We identified the need to support seniors to stay in their homes and communities by providing non-medical supports such as lawn care, minor repairs and snow shoveling. We formed a seniors' team and spent the year clarifying the issues, looking at other programs, consulting with other seniors' resource providers and lobbying our city politicians. This culminated in the Action Assembly, which was held on October 16th at the Temple B'nai Tikvah. **Two hundred of you turned out to demonstrate our strength and the importance of these issues. Your work and participation in this Assembly made a difference for Calgary's seniors.**

As a result, four city councilors, the Mayor and the province committed to work with us to support seniors in their homes. On October 30th our seniors' team met with the City of Calgary's Senior Services.

We are extremely excited to announce that the City of Calgary is now working to address 8 and a half of the 9 objectives we asked for and will be making this a priority! This will impact thousands of Calgary seniors, their families and communities for many years to come.

What we asked for was:

A non-medical home support for seniors that has:

1. Access across Calgary's geography.
2. Access across the economic spectrum using a sliding scale for financial support.
3. A spectrum of services to meet the variety of needs.
4. People who will connect seniors to service providers.
5. Trusted, competent service providers.
6. Service providers who can recognize signs of distress and refer the senior to appropriate resources.
7. Support for the development of Business/Service providers.
8. Public awareness/promotion of the program.
9. A gateway to connect seniors with other community resources.

So what is next?

1. As promised at our assembly a meeting with Minister Sigurdson on December 17th has been set up to discuss establishing the sliding scale (the other half a point).
2. Use our strengths to support this program. We will work with the city to:
 - a. Recruit potential service providers.
 - b. Promote the program ways that seniors can access it.
3. Promote other ways for communities to support seniors such as the established snow angel program.

Our victory is not yet complete until our seniors experience the positive difference this program makes for them and their communities. This is why we are building an alliance that will last. We will continue to engage with the city and monitor the program to ensure positive results for the future.

Recognition and Thanks

It is important that we recognize, express our appreciation and extend our gratitude to the leaders who have made this win possible. First and foremost this begins with our seniors' team members and the co-chairs Katharine Heimbigner-Tenor and Lee Woolery. They have shown significant skills and perseverance. Our CACG leaders have collectively created the capacity to make this and future victories possible. Those of you who came out to our Assembly and wrote letters to your city councilors; your work and participation definitely made a difference.

We want to recognize and express our appreciation to the public officials that have shown commitment to make this possible. This includes the city councilors who came to our assembly; Councilors Gonek, Chu, Chahal and Woolley; Mayor Nenshi and his staff, especially Nancy Close have helped move this forward. Thank you to City of Calgary Senior Services, especially Lisa Davis and Chris Hunter, who are developing and implementing this program. We also want to recognize the city staff, community agencies and their leaders that have also worked to address and advance these issues in our city.

The successful initiative is an example of how we can have a significant impact when we come together and use our shared power for the common good.

WISE MEN STILL

Seek Him

Matthew 2:11

On coming to the house, they saw the child with his mother Mary, and they bowed down and worshiped him. Then they opened their treasures and presented him with gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh.
