

From Pastor Julianne

In the first three months of the intentional interim time here at LCOS, we have experienced three sudden and tragic deaths, Advent and Christmas and the changes and transitions that simply come from a different pastoral leader. I am grateful for the patience and support many have offered me as I begin transitional ministry here.

In these next six months, together the congregation will have opportunities to explore, discern and articulate our identity, purpose and mission. While we have begun to explore our Baptismal identity, there is a need to better understand who we are today in this neighbourhood.

One of the next steps in our journey together is to fully participate in the Flourish Congregations national survey. (Dr Joel Thiessen, professor of Sociology at Ambrose University here in Calgary is spearheading this cross denominational survey to develop the best and right resources available to Canadian churches.) Each participating congregation will receive a free church specific report.

This opportunity fits this moment in our journey very well, as it asks us to answer questions about LCOS' organizational ethos including self-identity, leadership, innovation and structure and process. Questions will also speak to our diversity, hospitable community, engaged laity and discipleship. The third area of exploration is our outward approach to partnerships, evangelism and neighbourhood involvement.

The more participants we have in the survey, the more accurate and clear the picture of LCOS will be. All people who consider LCOS home are invited to add their voice to this exciting possibility to better understand who we are. The information from the survey will benefit the Call Committee who are preparing the congregational profile necessary for finding a new pastor, as well as other leaders in the congregation. Details on how to participate are available from the Call Committee.

In February, a diverse small group will meet with me for the first time as the transitional ministry team. Keith R., Jaqui A., Lloyd M., Terrylee Mc., Andrew L. will meet with me monthly to prayerfully consider and discern next steps as this intentional interim ministry unfolds.

We also can continue to explore the gifts the Holy Spirit gives us. On Sat. March 2 from 9:00 am to 4:00 pm, Jens K. will again offer the Redemptive Gifts course based on Romans 12:6-8. All are welcome!

A new small group, led by Pastor Julianne will gather on Wednesday evenings at 7:00 pm starting March 6, to share insights and things we wonder about, using the Book of Faith Lenten Journey. "You are invited to a forty-day journey exploring Romans 12. In this chapter the Apostle Paul calls us to new life in Christ and identifies the marks of the Christian life. David L. Miller's deep reflections and insightful questions will help you explore how your life is marked by Christ and consider how you live the marked life for the sake of the world." Friday February 1st at 7:00 pm - Tween Sleepover







The Lay Academy



The LAY ACADEMY is program of the Lutheran Theological Seminary and four Western Synods of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada (ELCIC). It evolved in response to the leadership needs of congregations and the interest expressed by the laity for a comprehensive program of study. Its purpose is to provide continuing education opportunities for lay people in the church and for those being prepared for ELCIC's national Authorized Lay Ministry program with learning that deepens the spiritual life, grows biblical and theological understanding, and develops skills and knowledge in leadership and discipleship.

Some of the LAY ACADEMY teaching is provided through an online format that allows multiple sites from across the four Western provinces and Territories to listen and interact with the presenter(s) simultaneously, while also enjoying discussion led by a facilitator within a local church or home setting. For a few hours on a Saturday morning congregations and individuals from British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba and Northern Ontario all connect as one for learning on topics like Prayer, our upcoming session in November 2018.





Each session each has 25 to 45 minutes of content followed by conversation or exercise periods. Everyone participating will reflect on the same presented material and discuss the questions posed in their own settings at the same time, despite 4 different time zones. To conclude there will be a 30 to 40 minute report-back period where participants have the opportunity to connect with one another and the presenter(s) with their thoughts and any further questions. It all makes for a great community educational experience! So please . . .

Medic Alert Registry for Vulnerable Persons

The Vulnerable Persons Registry has been in place for the last couple of years. They since realized that the maintenance of the registry was unsustainable and have partnered with Medic Alert Canada to do something similar. Several major cities including the entire province of Saskatchewan are now on this system.

Anyone who is potentially vulnerable can register with Medic Alert by going online or calling 1.800.668.1507

- Caregivers, family members or service providers can also do this with the person
- It is not restricted to age.

Translation is available in 140 languages.

If someone is missing, the caregiver calls 911 as usual and indicates that the missing vulnerable person has a Medic Alert ID

If a citizen has found someone that looks like they are confused or missing and that person has a Medic Alert bracelet, they can call Medic Alert and provide the number. Medic Alert will then contact caregiver and/ or police.

- The cost is \$60/year
- This includes the bracelet identifying Medic Alert with phone number and a specific file number to identify the registered person.
- If someone cannot afford the cost, they are open to negotiating a reduced cost or no cost if cost is a barrier.
- There is no 'means test.' Just a conversation.

The application allows one to provide a host of useful information including the opportunity to upload a recent photo and the name of a contact person/ caregiver.

Financials

Get on PAR (Pre-Authorized Remittance) at LCOS

Did you know that you may give to LCOS via pre-authorized remittance one time per month from your bank or credit union chequing account? This program is like any other pre-authorized debit program and is called the PAR (Pre-Authorized Remittance) program. Debits will be drawn from accounts on the 20th of each month. Whenever the 20th falls on a weekend or holiday, the debits will be drawn on the first business day following the 20th. Donations via the PAR program will be recorded on quarterly statements and year-end tax receipts along with all other giving.

Amounts from PAR can be directed to:

- 1) The LCOS general budget
- 2) Canadian Lutheran World Relief (CLWR)
- 3) Capital Maintenance

You can give additional amounts and to other purposes via your regular donation envelopes.

The minimum amount to give via this program is a total of \$50.00 per month.

You can sign up, make banking or donation amount changes, or withdraw from the program at any time. These changes will be effective the month following the submission of the change. Forms are available to process these changes. The program is administered by the Financial Secretary. Authorization forms are available in the Place of Welcome.

MY REFLECTIONS ON BEING ACCOUNTABLE TO ONE ANOTHER January 2019

"And let us hold unswervingly to the hope we profess, for He who promised is faithful. And let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds. Let us not give up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but let us encourage one another-----and all the more as you see the Day approaching (the day of the Lord's return)." Hebrews 10:23-25

Back in the 1950's I remember Saturday evenings very well. It was my job to put shoe polish on my younger brother and sister's shoes, shine them, and line them up for the next morning. We also took a turn in the square wash tub for our Saturday night bath. Firstly my baby sister, then the next three children, then me and finally my oldest brother. That was 6 bodies washed in the scummy water, but we survived the bath each week. **We were cleansed. Why?**

Every Sunday morning we would rise very early, walk one mile to our church. I had to run to keep up to dad who was 4 steps ahead of me, but he had one thing in mind, we were to be at church for 8 am. This was every Sunday. There was no question of not going, or should I go, or whatever reason I may have had to stay home. I was expected to be there with the rest of the family of God. This was a discipline that we had as a family, and as a community of believers. We were going to worship Our Awesome God. He was at the centre of our lives every day, and Sunday we would go to affirm our belief in Him. We came to give Him homage and adoration.

When I came out west on the train from Toronto in May 1970, I was now a young woman far away from home, and I carried with me the values that my parents instilled in me. In 1971, I met the love of my life Jens, and we soon started a family. It began in our early years of marriage that we would bring our young ones to God's church. We did the same as my parents, preparation Saturday eve, physically, and spiritually, remembering that an early start was important for a young family, (notice here we drove to church. Life had changed since the early 50's as very few people had cars). Many times it was a struggle with four-noncompliant children saying to us, "do I have to?" Our response was, "well, yes we are going to God's house to praise Him and worship Our Awesome God." Over the years, the children grew up thru the tough times of child rearing. We supported them through Bible School, witnessed their weddings, and have been blessed with our 12 precious grandchildren. I am thankful to see our grandchildren receiving similar values from their parents."

Hear, O Israel: The Lord our God, the Lord is one. Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength. These commandments that I give you today are to be upon your hearts. <u>Impress them on your children</u>. Talk about them when you sit at home and when you walk along the road, when you lie down and when you get up. Tie them as symbols on your hands and bind them on your foreheads. Write them on the doorframes of your houses and on your gates. Deuteronomy 6: 4-9

What I want to express here is how we can be accountable to one another. On Sunday we come together and praise and serve Our Lord as a community. Today our fast pace life- style is more frantic. We rush all week, and Saturday comes, and we are still rushing here and there. Then comes Sunday. Jens and I drive away from the comforts of our home, we observe all the cars parked along the street, quiet homes, silence in the neighbourhood, and yes, we are going to worship, to be with you, our community of believers. We can have all kinds of reasons not to be here on Sunday, but ultimately, we have the chance to be serious about our commitment to one another, to be here in God's Sanctuary, praising our God who waits for us to come, and being with Him in all our humbleness, and contrite hearts. For years I had to work weekends at the hospital two Sundays in a row. Although I knew my mission on those Sundays was to serve the sick, I missed your presence very much.

May I extend a hand and say thank you for coming with me to worship on Sunday. Pray about your commitment to God, to your precious families, and to one another. May we renew our attitudes of being present with one another." –but he rested on the 7th day. Therefore, the Lord blessed the Sabbath day and made it holy." Exodus 20:11. "You must observe my Sabbaths. This will be a sign between me and you for the generations to come, so you may know that I am the Lord, who makes you holy." Exodus 31:13. Remember the other stuff in life can wait, as God wants you to spend time with Him, and to be apart of His community of believers. Be a faithful servant with one another and come. "Therefore, since we are receiving a kingdom that cannot be shaken, let us be thankful, and so worship God acceptably with reverence and awe, for our God is a consuming fire." Hebrews 12:28-29

Dear Beloved of God -

Continuing education is an important piece for all rostered and lay leaders, including bishops.
