


### From Pastor Julianne

Last Sunday as we sang the Christmas carol *Go Tell it on the Mountain* I was thinking about how transformative the birth of Jesus was. For generations the people of Israel had been waiting for the Messiah but somehow the life and ministry of Jesus wasn't what they expected. Even more shocking was

the crucifixion of their beloved Rabbi and friend. Can you imagine hearing the words "He is Risen"!

Two years ago, about this time of year I was visiting my grandson Noah. He was far more excited than I was to go to the local Butterfly House. I expected the adventure to be like all the other butterfly houses I has seen, including those in some exotic far away countries.

We rounded a curve on the trail and saw a small window. As we got closer there were almost 100 chrysalises hanging on a string from one side of the window to the other, many of which had



God offers us new life in Christ's life, death and resurrection. Like the change from caterpillar to butterfly, our redemption from sinner to a transformed life is full of awe and wonder. Not only is it difficult to understand, but it is also difficult to accept the beauty, and wonder of God's love for us.



Noah and I stood with amazement as chrysalis after chrysalis began to open and beautiful blue morpho butterflies emerged. The butterflies worked their way out, one leg, one wing at a time, then tentatively spreading their wings, and after a while flying away to enjoy a transformed new life.

Perhaps our task as transformed, people gifted with new life in Christ, is to spread our wings and fly where the Spirit leads, joining in God's work of love all around us. Amen.

LCOS continues to take time to explore our identity and purpose. A few thoughts to consider:

Christianity in Canada is slowly focusing outward to the neighbourhood and the local context. Ministry has been done through programs which addressed perceived problems (e.g. "We don't have enough youth; we need youth ministry.") and were directed by the pastor. In the growing paradigm ministry is about vocation. Vocation is living out the spiritual; gifts given to us in Baptism. Vocation is expressed in relationships with all people.

In the past, outreach was about doing nice things for others who were in need. We would share something we had with those who we perceived as our responsibility to serve. Today some express outreach as a combination of advocacy, relationship building and service.

### Youth & Children's Ministry by Jesse Ramson

Conversations are so important. They help us connect to each other, they help us understand each other, and they help us develop together. This past month and a bit, I have had some fantastic conversations with parents, with youth, with children, and with seniors. Perhaps the biggest take away from each conversation is how insightful, and honestly life-changing, the content that we are talking about is. What I thought I knew, well, these discussions just show me how much I don't know! Which is an amazing thing, because it helps me to see these things in a much broader sense, giving me a more wholesome understanding of people, of events, and of issues.

I truly believe that the focus or the perspective of the conversation is just as important as the content. We need to be approaching these discussions with the right frame of mind; how can we best be witnesses to Christ? How can we best use these opportunities to share the name of Jesus? I believe that in each conversation, in each talk we have with others, we can share the light of our Lord simply in how we approach those discussions. And people pick up on those things, trust me! When you approach a conversation with the mindset of Christ, the recipient feels love, grace, inspiration, passion, and so many other incredible positive things. And at the end of the day, isn't our mission to be an inviting Christian presence that passionately lives and shares Jesus?





#### Get on PAR (Pre-Authorized Remittance) at LCOS

Did you know that you may give to LCOS via pre-authorized remittance one time per month from your bank or credit union chequing account? This program is like any other pre-authorized debit program and is called the PAR (Pre-Authorized Remittance) program. Debits will be drawn from accounts on the 20th of each month. Whenever the 20th falls on a weekend or holiday, the debits will be drawn on the first business day following the 20th. Donations via the PAR program will be recorded on quarterly statements and year-end tax receipts along with all other giving.

#### Amounts from PAR can be directed to:

- 1) The LCOS general budget
- 2) Canadian Lutheran World Relief (CLWR)
- 3) Capital Maintenance

You can give additional amounts and to other purposes via your regular donation envelopes.

The minimum amount to give via this program is a total of \$50.00 per month.

You can sign up, make banking or donation amount changes, or withdraw from the program at any time. These changes will be effective the month following the submission of the change. Forms are available to process these changes. The program is administered by the Financial Secretary. Authorization forms are available in the Place of Welcome.





### Calgary Alliance for the Common Good



The Calgary Alliance for the Common Good will be hosting it's next Discernment Assembly on April 1st at 7:00 pm at Temple B'Nai Tikvah (900 47 Ave SW). All members of CACG are invited to participate in this important event. At the Assembly CACG will be selecting the next two issues that CACG Members will advocate for change for the Common Good of the City. At the last Discernment Assembly in 2017 the topics selected were Truth and Reconciliation and Seniors issues. The Truth and Reconciliation work is ongoing with a group of Elders in the Calgary area. CACG's seniors group including LCOS members Pastor Lee Woolery, Katharine Heimbigner-Tenor, Alice Rodier and Darren Tenor are presently working with the City of Calgary to ensure the home support program being developed by the City is implemented by the fall. After the election this group will be reaching out to the province with the objective of developing a sliding scale to help middle income seniors stay in their homes.

At the upcoming Assembly those present will choose two topics from the following list: Mental Health, Seniors, Environment, Early Learning/Care, Immigration/Refugees, Good Jobs/Income including living wage, basic income, training and re-training, and Social Isolation/Building Community/Overcoming Divisions including transportation, community spaces, community programs, connecting youth, seniors and immigrants to their communities.

### Bishop's Message by Bishop Larry Kochendorfer

Dear Beloved of God -

Following the meeting of our National Church Council, March 8-10, 2019, the Western Synod's Examining Committee will also meet in Winnipeg. This meeting is one of the highlights of my year as your synod bishop.

The committee, comprised of one member from each of the four Western Synods, a faculty member from Lutheran Theological Seminary and the candidate's bishop, will meet this year with five candidates two of whom are from the Synod of Alberta and the Territories.

In the Lutheran tradition, a person's call from God to public ministry is understood as both internal and external or mediated:

- 1. through an internal, personal sense of call that God is leading a person to public Christian ministry.
- 2. through public affirmation that the person has the character, commitment, preparation and ability to serve in a specific public ministry, either ordained or diaconal.
- through the receipt and acceptance of a letter of call to serve in a particular ministry setting.The responsibility for approval of candidates for rostered ministry in the ELCIC rests with the synods.

The final evaluation of candidates for rostered ministry is in two parts: the written examination (members of the committee are provided with the candidate's responses to a written examination, as well as all other pertinent material from the candidate's dossier) and the examination interview.

The final evaluation is to review and inquire in depth into the candidate's readiness for rostered ministry, and to determine that the candidate meets the requirements for ministry established by the National Church.

The areas of readiness reviewed during the interview are: theological and academic competence, spirituality and faith commitment, personal integrity and leadership abilities, and, call to ministry and ministry gifts.

By the time you read this April Message the Western Synod's Examining Committee will have met and I am hopeful that I will be in conversation regarding Calls to parish ministry and Services of Ordination.

Thank you for your continuing prayers for all candidates for rostered ministry across the ELCIC and for those prayerfully considering candidacy, for members of our ELCIC's Program Committee for Leadership for Ministry, for our seminaries, and for candidacy committees.
