From the Sacred Valley by Peggy Mahn Part One


You were born for this.


The congregation was blessed by the worship leadership of the LCOS Youth Band on May 26.

In Mission with El Salvador

2018 Annual Report

As is to be expected, in this 31st year of ministry in El Salvador, 2018 was another full, intense, and rich year of ministry, on behalf of the ABT Synod's program, "In Mission with El Salvador" / "En Misión con El Salvador."

Unfortunately, early in 2019, my 2018 agenda / appointment book went missing. This is where I had my day-to-day activities recorded. Consequently, this annual report will have less detail than it would otherwise have contained. Perhaps that is for the best.

I continued on as board member of CRISPAZ for my 10th year, beyond the normal limit of 9 years, at the request of the CRISPAZ board. I served as executive secretary for this, my second year, at the request of the board. My "retirement" from CRISPAZ came at the time of our annual meeting in November. It has been a valuable experience of solidarity and service, especially to Salvadorans and to supporters in the USA. We did enjoy yet another visit from a Canadian delegation hosted by CRISPAZ. Luther College in Regina sent a high school delegation of 18 youth and 4 adults for 10 days in February 2018, after missing a couple years. It was an enriching and worthwhile experience for all involved.

2018 was an election year in El Salvador. These elections were municipal and legislative. Again, I served as election observer and assistant through the CIS, along with a diverse team of 70 persons from 12 countries. Again, this was a rewarding way of immersing myself in the Salvadoran population in a variety of election-related settings, along with a small team, and the full team, of CIS volunteers, some here just for the election week, others for several months of planning, coordination, reporting, and evaluation. My contact with these folks is frequent and ongoing. At various points we linked with other election observation teams, such as the ecumenical team, led by Lutherans, and with several Lutheran members, both Salvadoran and international.

IPAZ-Pastoral Initiative for Peace-continued to meet for three hours weekly throughout the year in Bishop Gomez's office. IPAZ planned numerous events, especially press conferences, and responded to numerous requests for assistance in cases requiring dialogue. It suffered some attrition, through the death of two founding members, the imprisonment of a couple regular members, and the loss of interest and distancing of numerous other members. Bishop Gómez attributes such distancing to fear, since the government was becoming more and more threatening in its opposition to dialogue as a way of promoting peace in Salvadoran society, which is the conviction and dedication of IPAZ. Others may see it as a failure of IPAZ to maintain a consistent strategy or to follow through on the numerous ambitious and promising ideas and proposals presented by diverse members of IPAZ.

In Mission with El Salvador (continued)

As prison ministry continued to be an impossibility, especially due to the government's "extraordinary measures," now in their third year, prohibiting members of civilian society from entering prisons, and maintaining the prison population extremely isolated and out of range of communication with the outside world, I linked up with the Lutheran Church's "Pastoral Migrante," (Ministry to Migrants), seeking to respond to the myriad needs of those who have left home or are feeling the need to do so (such as those fleeing to the USA, and those deported from the USA), due to a variety of reasons.

I continued to rework and revise my DMin thesis—"Dialogue as a Faith Response to Social Violence in El Salvador"—throughout the year. It focuses on the faith response of IPAZ and its pursuit of dialogue leading to social peace.

I participated in the AIDS Conference, including the Interfaith Pre-Conference, for a week in July. This bi-annual event was held in Amsterdam this year. There I joined numerous long-time friends and over 20,000 new colleagues. The event met my high expectations, built up over a couple decades of attendance. My primary disappointment is that the event, and its numerous interwoven themes, such as discrimination and exclusion, are of such little interest to most Canadian Lutherans.

I continued to accompany the HIV mutual support group at Rosales Public Hospital, primarily at their bimonthly three-hour meetings, attended by about 50 persons. These are led by a team of psychologists and social workers at the hospital, who welcome my participation enthusiastically, along with the members.

Not being able to conduct seminars in prisons freed me to accompany the two week-long health brigades in March, conducted by Lutheran teams of about 15 members each from ELCA churches in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. These provided me with welcome immersions into numerous Lutheran church-communities in El Salvador, as well as an opportunity for mutual enrichment with numerous ELCA Lutherans, from youth to seniors, lay members to bishops. They have developed these health-days over the years into smoothly-flowing, effective events of holistic health services (up to 20 different kiosks), faith and social accompaniment, and solidarity.

I had a couple opportunities to preach at Resurrection Lutheran Church, once at the Monday morning staff devotional.

2018 was a good year for contact with numerous ELCIC congregations throughout the ABT Synod.

Financials

Get on PAR (Pre-Authorized Remittance) at LCOS

Did you know that you may give to LCOS via pre-authorized remittance one time per month from your bank or credit union chequing account? This program is like any other pre-authorized debit program and is called the PAR (Pre-Authorized Remittance) program. Debits will be drawn from accounts on the 20th of each month. Whenever the 20th falls on a weekend or holiday, the debits will be drawn on the first business day following the 20th. Donations via the PAR program will be recorded on quarterly statements and year-end tax receipts along with all other giving.

Amounts from PAR can be directed to:

- 1) The LCOS general budget
- 2) Canadian Lutheran World Relief (CLWR)
- 3) Capital Maintenance

You can give additional amounts and to other purposes via your regular donation envelopes.

The minimum amount to give via this program is a total of \$50.00 per month.

You can sign up, make banking or donation amount changes, or withdraw from the program at any time. These changes will be effective the month following the submission of the change. Forms are available to process these changes. The program is administered by the Financial Secretary. Authorization forms are available in the Place of Welcome.

Party Planning & Wall Preparation:


- Help us plan a party for 600 or so of your closest Acadia friends and family

Bishop's Message by Bishop Larry Kochendorfer

Dear Beloved of God -

We have gathered at the rural church. Many have journeyed for several hours to be present and to participate in the service of ordination and installation. Once the worship begins and the procession has landed me near the altar, I look out over those whom the Spirit has assembled: farmers, council and call committee members, several children and a handful of youth, family and friends, and seminary professors and staff and colleagues.

It seems as if even the sounds of the building are part of a sacred conversation between congregation, God and the one to be ordained and installed. A yellowed fluorescent light hums its way through the service. The microphone on the lectern squeals when the reader gets too close. The air from the furnace whooshes into the sanctuary causing the banners to wave.

Those to be ordained and installed will spend their years baptizing babies, helping to deliver calves in the middle of the night, burying husbands who died too soon, negotiating debates about how to pay for the new church roof...and then every Sunday, they will stand in the pulpit and try to make holy sense of it all.

Mid-March I prepared this article, originally for the June *Canada Lutheran*, while basking in the glow of participating in the final evaluation of candidates for rostered ministry. It is my favorite time of year, spent reviewing written examination materials and candidate dossiers and participating in the colloquy (the examination interview).

The final evaluation is a time to review and inquire in depth into the candidate's readiness for rostered ministry, and to determine that the candidate meets the requirements established by the National Church.

The examining committee, comprised of capable, insightful, experienced and compassionate members, considers the following determinants of readiness: theological and academic competence, spirituality and faith commitment, personal integrity and leadership abilities, and call to ministry and ministry gifts.

It is my favorite time of year, for I have walked with the candidates together with the synod candidacy committee, and the seminary, and the internship placement supervisor and congregation, and family and friends and seminary classmates to this point of final evaluation.

And truly, marvelously, wonderfully I have seen God at work in the life of each candidate.

And now, the procession has landed me near the altar where I preside at the service of ordination and the area dean presides over the installation.

The plan of the newly ordained and installed is no strategic plan for "turning this church around." No, their only ambition—their call—is to be next in a long line of faithful pastors serving with and among this congregation seeking to join God in God's mission of reconciliation and restoration.

With the service over and the obligatory pictures taken, we make our way to the community hall for a potluck dinner. Everyone plops into metal folding chairs and eats, laughs and gossips. Tables are filled with casseroles, salads and a multitude of homemade desserts. Children squeal as they chase each other around the room and out the doors of the hall.

I overhear a story about snow tires. They could be discussing their anxieties about the future of family farms, the economy or "just where is this country heading?" But there is none of that on this day. Even the small talk has a lilt to it.

I understand why, when their new pastor enters the room, many are simply there to extend a warm welcome. One after another they get up from the tables, wipe their hands and approach the pastor for a handshake or a hug. Many have tears in their eyes.

This is a eucharistic feast. A new pastor has come. To the congregation it is a sign that God knows how to find them. The holiness of the room is so apparent that I almost take off my shoes. No one wants to leave—certainly not me, and certainly not the new pastor.

This is my glimpse into a mystery about our church that is hidden from the statistics and anxiety about its decline.

I have no idea what hardships lie ahead for this congregation, or how long it will even exist. But I know that its people are filled with expectancy. In their midst is another highly capable pastor who is prepared to bring thousands of years of theological hope to bear on their community —a pastor who finds holiness by sitting in a community hall swapping stories about snow tires, and who every Sunday will stand in the pulpit and try to make holy sense of all of it.
