Growing Deeper in Prayer

It is my hope that you will be encouraged to grow deeper in prayer; knowing the blessings that will be yours and our church through this gift from God.

Board Report by Nick Perchthaler

It was great to hold our 2023 Annual General Meeting (AGM) as per pre pandemic protocols again. We had 54 members attend in person. The fact that we held a potluck lunch afterwards probably helped contribute to that number. If you feed them, they will come! There was great fellowship after the AGM.

For the Board, this is a new beginning. As per the congregational approval, we welcomed back Doug Gerbrandt and Jens Kaack, who have previously served on the Board a few years ago. They will join Alfred Forbrich, Beverly Marshall and Brian Prunkle who have agreed to another two-year term and Carolyn Anderson, Kathy Gibson, Nick Perchthaler and Debra Starratt, who are on the second year of their term. It looks like a great team for 2023! At this time, we would also like to thank the four outgoing Board members, who will not be returning. A huge Thank You goes out to Brent Anderson, Lois Beuttenmiller, Dale Mass and Iain McKay for their contributions during their tenure.

The new Board has elected the Board Executive for 2023. The Board Secretary is Beverly Marshall, the Board Vice Chair is Alfred Forbrich and the Board Chair is Nick Perchthaler. It will be another exciting year for us.

During the AGM, we talked about our upcoming challenges. The congregation approved our 2023 budget deficit of \$66,244. We finished 2022 with a deficit of just under \$20,000, which was a lot better than what we budgeted for. Our Treasurer, Doug Drennan, told us that we came through the pandemic in a net positive financial position, which is extremely positive. But for 2023, our budget will have a lot less flexibility. The Board, along with our Treasurer and Financial Secretary monitor both our Expenses and Giving every month. But what we are experiencing is a Giving issue.

Pastor Greg referred to this year's budget as being a "Forward Thinking Budget". And that is very true. We are paying forward towards the future. Last year the focus was on potential growth opportunities and we focussed on Technology, Youth and Family Ministry and Outreach. We believe that we achieved what we wanted to and these items are now in place and we will continue working on them in 2023. We have already seen some very positive growth as we have welcomed new members over the past year. The feedback that we have received is that we are a very welcoming congregation. God bless our congregation!

The new Board will hold a Board Retreat in April to look at our priorities for 2023. Our risks regarding our financial situation and Building maintenance requirements will be high on our discussion list. The Board will continue to monitor our situation and we will have to get very creative in how we resolve our issues. And as always, we would really like to hear from you about any suggestions that you may have.

It is obviously still early in the year, but we are already seeing a deficit in our financials. After January we had a slight surplus, but that was offset by a deficit in February and we expect to finish the month with a year-to-date deficit of about \$5,200. Hence my comments regarding our budget concerns. We do not want to sound too alarmist right now, but we do want to make sure that the congregation understands our situation. It is worth noting that we do have a bit of a financial nest egg, which can help us out if needed for this year. But if nothing changes, this buffer will be gone for next year.

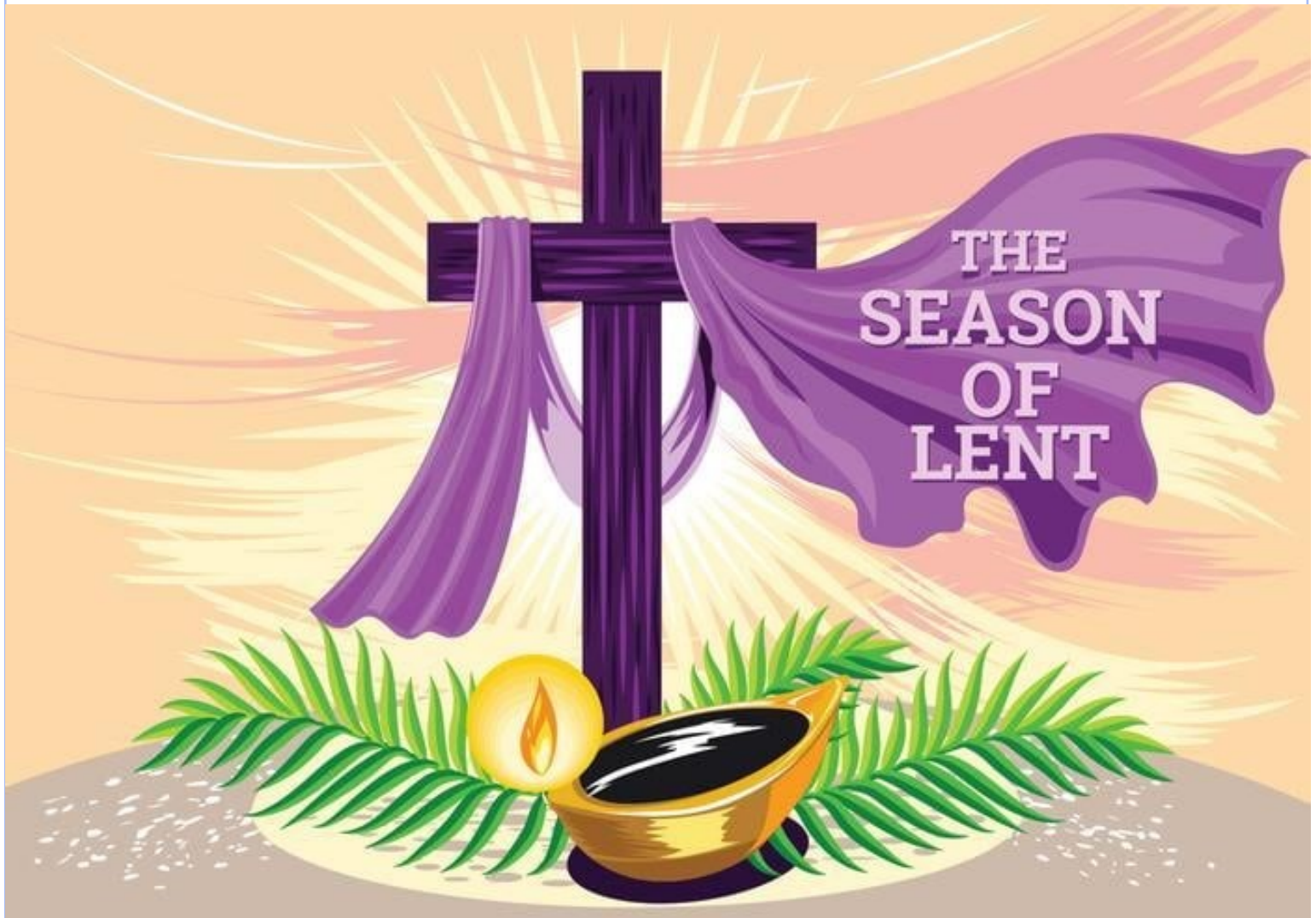

A True Servant

John 13:1-15

Now before the feast of the passover, when Jesus knew that his hour was come that he should depart out of this world unto the Father, having loved his own which were in the world, he loved them unto the end. And supper being ended, the devil having now put into the heart of Judas Iscariot, Simon's son, to betray him; Jesus knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he was come from God, and went to God;

He riseth from supper, and laid aside his garments; and took a towel, and girded himself.

After that he poureth water into a bason, and began to wash the disciples' feet, and to wipe them with the towel wherewith he was girded.

Then cometh he to Simon Peter: and Peter saith unto him, Lord, dost thou wash my feet?

Jesus answered and said unto him, What I do thou knowest not now; but thou shalt know hereafter.

Peter saith unto him, Thou shalt never wash my feet. Jesus answered him, If I wash thee not, thou hast no part with me.

Simon Peter saith unto him, Lord, not my feet only, but also my hands and my head.

Jesus saith to him, He that is washed needeth not save to wash his feet, but is clean every whit: and ye are clean, but not all.

For he knew who should betray him; therefore said he, Ye are not all clean.

So after he had washed their feet, and had taken his garments, and was set down again, he said unto them, Know ye what I have done to you?

Ye call me Master and Lord: and ye say well; for so I am.

If I then, your Lord and Master, have washed your feet; ye also ought to wash one another's feet.

For I have given you an example, that ye should do as I have done to you.

Do you equate success with wealth, acclaim, and power? If we measured by these standards, then Jesus, who was rejected by His community and didn't even have a house of His own, was a failure. But, of course, we know that's not the case. So God must use something other than these worldly goals to define success. In fact, Scripture is clear that Jesus Christ is our example—we should strive to be like Him.

So, what exactly was our Savior's mission? In today's passage, we see the answer through His actions: He came to serve. The disciples, wanting recognition and reward, were arguing about who'd be the greatest in heaven. In contrast, Jesus took off His outer garment and performed the task of the lowliest servant: He washed the dirty feet of His followers. The next day, Almighty God was crucified by His own creation. In allowing this, He offered salvation to all—even those who nailed Him to a cross.

Jesus deserved glory but chose sacrifice and pain. And He asks that we follow His example of service. With the exception of Judas, His disciples obeyed. In fact, they all faced great difficulty and most died brutal deaths because of their faith. But they willingly walked the path of humility because of what Jesus had taught them: "The last shall be first, and the first last" (Matt. 20:16).

How do you spend your resources and time? And which topics dominate your thoughts and conversation? These are a few indicators of the driving goals in your life. You may long for worldly recognition, but God has a higher calling for His children. Ask Him to foster a servant's attitude in your heart.

Cheque:

Online Giving (via credit or debit card **):

I hope you're doing well. My name is Anjali Rebekah Jayalath, I am currently a Biological Sciences student at University of Calgary and I work as a community connector with Lutheran Campus Ministry. We are a pluralistic and affirmative community with a presence at MRU, University of Calgary and at SAIT, where we run events that provide students with an opportunity to build community by finding support and strength from each other.

You probably know one of my bosses Rev. Margaret Propp, and this year we have a goal to address food insecurity on campus for **Lent**. This initiative is to support existing resources on campus that combat food insecurity because this is a very important and pressing issue for many students. Studies have constantly shown rates of 30-40% of students in Canadian post secondary education being food insecure, with Alberta having higher rates due to being the most food insecure province in Canada. Unfortunately, these numbers have only drastically increased since the pandemic.

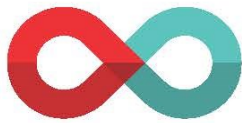

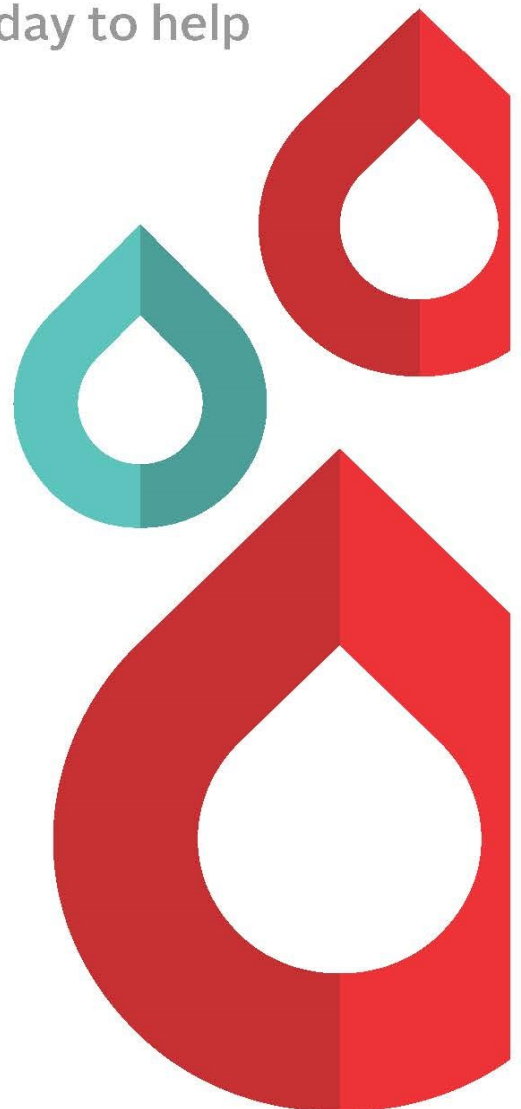

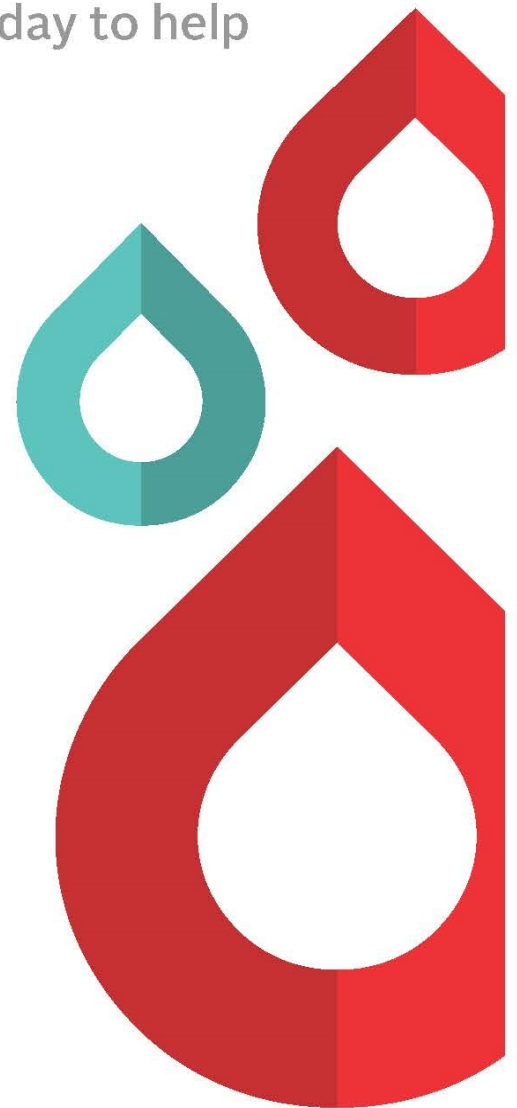

March 2023 Message for Congregations and Lay and Rostered Leaders

Dear Beloved of God -

Earth to earth, ashes to ashes, dust to dust.

Death is a reminder of the brevity of life on earth and of the universal, inescapable nature of life's end. In the face of death, care for the dying and those who have died is a fundamental sign of humanness, giving expression to deeply held convictions about the meaning of life.

The church's most deeply held conviction is the *paschal mystery*: Christ's saving passage through death to resurrected life as the new creation – the same passage that Christ calls the baptized to follow. When the church gathers to mark the end of life, the paschal mystery in which the baptized live is our source of worship, the heartbeat of mutual consolation, the hope of healing, and increasingly, I am becoming convinced, the opportunity for practices that speak to the "dust" of our existence as part of care for the earth.

For some time now, I have been thinking about green (or "natural") burials, which focus on reducing the environmental impacts on the earth by promoting simplicity and sustainability, seeking to reduce the carbon emissions, toxins released, and waste produced.

Broadly speaking, natural burial means caring for the dead with minimal environmental impact. Natural burials use no embalming chemicals, use a shroud or a biodegradable coffin, and avoid cement, steel, and non-biodegradable materials conventional burials put into the earth. A natural burial also lacks the carbon footprint of cremation, which has been calculated as the equivalent of a 500-mile car journey.

For some people natural burial also involves a more participatory burial process: washing and dressing your loved one's body at home, accompanying them to the grave site, physically laying them into the ground, and then fully covering their body with dirt.

This contemporary Western resurgence of green burials began in 1993 when Ken West, head of bereavement services for the city of Carlisle, England, opened up an area of grassland bordering the municipal cemetery for burials. His goal was to find a way to integrate wildlife with burial, so he also offered families the option of planting an oak tree at the grave site instead of erecting a gravestone.

The idea took off. When three British researchers studied burial grounds in the United Kingdom in 2013, they found that 268 natural burial sites had been created in the two decades after West's initial project.

The Green Burial Society of Canada (www.greenburialcanada.ca) defines green and natural burials by five simple principles:

No Embalming — In natural burials, embalming is not done as the chemical agents used in this process are harmful to the environment. With that in mind, bodies can still be prepared for burial and viewing made possible with refrigeration and the use of environmentally sensitive soaps, lotions, and disinfectants.

Direct Earth Burial — The body is wrapped in biodegradable material, often a shroud, and interred directly into the earth. Alternatively, the shrouded body can be placed into a casket or alternative container, where the casket or container is also made of sustainable and fully biodegradable materials. Ideally, the shroud or casket will be locally sourced, as close as possible to the deceased's place of death and burial.

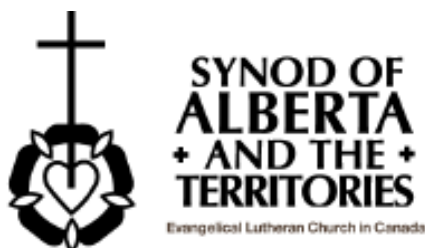
Ecological Restoration and Conservation — Visitation to the green burial site is sensitively managed, such as staying on designated pathways, to ensure the peaceful cohabitation of wildlife and visitors wanting to commemorate loved ones. Preservation is a key component, as green burials aim to integrate gravesites into the natural ecosystem. Once a natural burial has been completed, the surface of every grave is planted with locally indigenous plant materials, using a combination of groundcover, shrubs, and trees.

Communal Memorialization — For green burials the use of individual memorials is discouraged. Instead, communal memorialization, again using naturally sourced materials, is placed in the natural burial cemetery. Ultimately it is the green burial site as whole that becomes a living memorial to the persons interred there.

Optimized Land Use — The site is designed to optimize land use to further promote natural sustainability and the environment it is located in.

This Lent I will be thinking more, and making decisions for my burial, mindful of the paschal mystery, including both my baptism into Christ and care for the earth.
